## Preface

SHARING ABOUT MY WORK on the topic of justice advocacy for the poor, marginalized, and disenfranchised in the post-9/11 world of Trump and COVID has elicited many responses from people across all walks of life. On one very meaningful occasion, a woman whom I had never met before overheard me talking to an acquaintance in a Barnes and Nobles bookstore about my work on poverty language in the Psalter and correlations in ancient religious perspectives about the poor. She sought me out afterward and told me how important my work is and she 'just wanted to say thank you" for my effort. I realize there is irony in working on a topic that encourages ambiguity, acceptance, and ethical reflection in an academic context, where academia has earned a reputation of siloed, isolationist and elitist perspectives. I anticipate and work toward a collaborative and interdisciplinary future in academic research. This thesis incorporates biblical, theological, and literary theories from global perspectives about psalms, ethics, and resistance theory. It is only the beginning.

Psalm 82 is a Hebrew Bible text with a reputation for being particularly difficult to interpret. The most significant published scholarship on the Psalm was a study by Julian Morgenstern in 1939. Since that time scholars have been theorizing about the meaning of the Psalm and its origins. In that Psalm 82 is often analyzed for its meaning as a Hebrew Bible text, the central issue has been generally limited to the translation and interpretation of אֵלהִים in verse one and its subsequent use in the composition, which continues to be a source of much debate and speculation. Meanwhile, scholarship has largely avoided giving adequate attention to the profound ethical themes in the psalm. Central ethical themes revolving around righteousness, wickedness and a response to poverty in Psalm 82 have not been adequately recognized as an intentional contribution of the psalm.

This study develops a holistic approach to interpreting Psalm 82 by examining characteristics of the text that may uncover implicit ethics and

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social concerns about justice, and a concern for the poor and marginalized in the ancient Near Eastern world. Following Zimmermann's model for discovering implicit ethics in an ancient biblical text, this study explores multiple features of Psalm 82 that support an ethical reading. These features include its probable Northern Israelite compositional setting, intentional ambiguity, linguistic focus on the poor and marginalized in society, a mythological heritage, and its reception in the Second Temple Period as resistance literature.
