The Most Reverend Chrysostomos, who holds multiple undergraduate and graduate degrees in history and psychology, received his doctoral degree at Princeton University. He has held professorships in psychology at the University of California and Ashland University and was a visiting lecturer in Eastern Christian thought at the Ashland Theological Seminary and Visiting Professor of Patristics and the Psychology of Religion at the Theological Institute of Uppsala University, in Sweden. As a Fulbright Scholar in Romania, and subsequently Executive Director of the U.S. Fulbright Commission in that country, he taught Byzantine history at the University of Bucharest, consumer behavior at the University of Iaşi, and the theology of ecclesiastical art at the Ion Mincu University of Architecture. A former visiting scholar at the Harvard Divinity School, Pembroke College (Oxford University), the University of Washington, Seattle, and the Graduate Theological Union at Berkeley, His Eminence was most recently the Larson Fellow in Health and Spirituality at the Kluge Center of the United States Library of Congress. He is the author of numerous books and scholarly articles and chief translator of the English version of the four-volume Greek collection of the writings of the ascetic Fathers of the Christian East, the *Evergetinos*. In retirement, he is Senior Research Scholar at the Center for Traditionalist Orthodox Studies (C.T.O.S.) in Etna, California.

Archimandrite Father Patapios, a graduate of Cambridge University in Classics and Philosophy, received his doctoral degree in patristics at the Graduate Theological Union (G.T.U.), Berkeley, where he was a Newhall Teaching Fellow. Former Lecturer in sacred languages at the St. Joseph of Arimathea Anglican Theological College, he is now Academic Director of the C.T.O.S.
